Dear parents,

This summer, we are asking our families to help us curb some of the summer learning loss through two different initiatives. We are hopeful that keeping our students focused on a few academic activities will help reinforce some of the learning that occurred during the school year and also keep their brains growing throughout the summer.

First, we are sending home “Summer Solutions” books in Math for all of our students. Your child will probably be receiving a book for the grade that they have just completed. This is to help reinforce mathematical concepts and learning from this school year as well as keep the students engaged in analytical thinking through the summer. There are 30 lessons in each book. Students are asked to complete at least one lesson per week. However, feel free to finish the book! Students should bring the books to school on August 24th.

Second, all students have the opportunity to work on IXL throughout the summer. Enclosed in the family envelope is your child’s login. The link to our Bishop Flaget portal can be found under Summer Learning on the school website and FACTS. Students can also login through Clever. Students can practice both reading and math skills in IXL. Encourage your child to practice grade level material at least 30 minutes per week. While this is not required, it is highly recommended. We will be monitoring student progress in relation to time spent on IXL this summer.

Finally, we are asking our middle school students to complete a summer reading project this year. The students are being asked to read one assigned novel and one novel of their choice this summer. There are accompanying assignments for each book. These assignments are due on the first day of school. Assignment packets are included in the family envelope, have been emailed to students, and are included on the school website under Summer Learning. Please encourage your student to work on this throughout the summer rather than waiting until right before school starts. We would like this to be an enjoyable experience, not a chore.

Thank you for your support in curbing summer learning loss and helping us help your students develop and maintain good learning habits. Enjoy your summer!

8th Grade Summer Reading Assignment - Anthem

“Pre”search

Who is Ayn Rand? Look her up online and write a 3-5 sentence summary of her biographical information.

Ayn Rand wrote Anthem in 1937. List five significant world events that occurred with technology, music, medicine, or war in the years 1935-1938.

Who are “Prometheus” and “Gaea” from Greek mythology?

Choose one of the following prompts as your final essay for Anthem.

Use quotations from the book and use proper MLA parenthetical citations. Support your answer with reasoning and references to the novel. (Your answer should be 600-1200 words in length.)

1. In *Anthem*, Ayn Rand does not indicate the race of any of the characters, nor does she suggest that racial prejudice is present in the story. But are there other forms of prejudice in the society of *Anthem*? If so, against what or whom are they directed and why? In what ways are these forms of prejudice similar to or different from racial prejudice?
2. Do you think that Equality 7-2521 is selfish? In your answer, give examples from the story that support your answer. In what ways is Equality's approach to life and to the other characters in the story similar to or different from what we normally think of as "selfish"? What lessons do you draw from the story about what it means to pursue your own interests?
3. Do you find Liberty 5-3000 to be an admirable character? In your answer, give examples from the story about her actions, attitude, or character that lead you to answer as you do. In what ways is Liberty similar to or different from other women whom we are taught to admire?

Book of your choice - Choose a book to read for enjoyment. It can be a novel, a graphic novel, or a nonfiction book. However, it needs to be on your reading level and should be more than 100 pages. Choose five of the prompts from the type of literature that you chose (fiction or non-fiction) to complete this assignment.

Fiction Reader Response Prompts.

Explain your answers.

1. What was your story about? Describe the most important events as they occurred in your reading.
2. What is the theme of your story? (Examples: survival, friendship, loneliness, fear, guilt, honesty, growing up, etc.) Is there a moral?
3. What is the main problem or issue in your story?
4. Have you read books that are similar to this story? If so, explain.
5. Did something happen in your life that is similar to the events in the story?
6. Did any part of this book make you laugh or cry? Explain.
7. What is your opinion of this book? Would you recommend it to someone else? Why or why not?
8. Was this a difficult book to read? Explain.
9. At what point in the book were you "hooked"? Why?
10. Does this book give you any ideas for future writing pieces of your own?
11. Describe the setting of this section of the story. Did the author help you to visualize it? Does the setting influence the events of the story?
12. What character do you remember the most? Why?
13. If you were one of the characters in the book, would you have acted differently?
14. I wish _____ had happened...
15. I wish the author had included....
16. I was furious when...
17. I like the way the author...
18. Do any of the characters remind you of friends, family members, or classmates? Explain.
19. Do you think the title fits the book? Why or why not?
20. How would the story be different if it was told...(choose ONLY one)

 - c. in a different time period?
21. If you were making this book into a movie, what part(s) would you cut out or change? Why?
22. Write a eulogy (a speech honoring someone after death) for one of the characters.
23. Illustrate a book cover different from what is on your book.
24. Give 3 reasons why this book should be taught to the whole class.
25. Write a note to the author of your book.
26. Discuss a portion of the book that was too predictable.
27. Write a letter to a character in your story.
28. Make a timeline of the major events (minimum 5 events) in this story.

Nonfiction Reader Response Prompts

1. Why did you choose this book? Explain.
2. Briefly explain what the book is about.
3. Tell at least three things that you have learned reading this book.
4. Did this book hold your interest? Why or why not?
5. What part of the book has been most interesting to you?
6. Were the illustrations or pictures in this book helpful in explaining the topic of the book? Explain.
7. Did the book leave you with any unanswered questions? Explain.
8. What is the author's purpose?
9. What kinds of details does the author use to support his/her claims?
10. What is the text structure of this book? (Examples: cause-effect, descriptive, compare-contrast, problem-solution, chronological) Was it effective?
11. Can you make a connection between this book and another fiction book you have read?
12. How does something that you have read connect to your life or the world around you?
13. Were there any technical words in this section that were new to you? Look them up in the dictionary and write the meaning.
14. What would another title for this book be? Why?
15. Is there anything that the author wrote that you agree or disagree with?
16. I really don't understand the part when...
17. Questions I have after reading are...
