Please encourage your student to work on this throughout the summer rather than waiting until right before school starts. We would like this to be an enjoyable experience, not a chore.

Be sure you read the instructions on the assignments carefully. Spelling, grammar, punctuation, and mechanics are important and will count as part of the grade. The assignments should be typed in a google doc and shared with or emailed to aharper@bishopflaget.org. Any AI-generated responses will not be accepted and will result in a zero for the assignment.

The assigned books are as follows:

- Grade 6-The Giver by Lois Lowry
- Grade 7 - The Man Who Was Poe by Avi
- Grade 8 - To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

Wheatberry Books on 2nd St. has been contacted about Bishop Flaget summer reading, and they will be carrying a small stock of the assigned novels. All of these books are available from Amazon as well. Keep in mind that a physical copy of the book will be necessary when school starts since we will be using them during the first part of the first quarter.

Directions: During and after reading, answer the following journal questions. Spelling, grammar, punctuation, and mechanics are important and will count as part of the grade. All answers must be typed in a google doc and shared with or emailed to Mrs. Harper at aharper@bishopflaget.org. (My recommendation is to make a copy of the assignment from your google drive.)
Any Al-generated responses will not be accepted and will result in a zero for the assignment.

1. How does Scout's understanding of empathy and perspective evolve throughout the novel?
2. What role does racial prejudice play in shaping the events of the trial and its outcome?
3. How does Harper Lee use symbolism to convey the theme of innocence in To Kill a Mockingbird?
4. What lessons can be learned from Atticus Finch's approach to parenting and his moral integrity?
5. How does the setting of Maycomb County contribute to the overall mood and tone of the novel?
6. Discuss the significance of the title, "To Kill a Mockingbird," and its relevance to the characters and events in the story.
7. Analyze the role of minor characters such as Calpurnia and Miss Maudie in shaping the narrative and the development of Scout and Jem.
8. How does the first-person narrative point of view enhance the reader's understanding of the events and themes in the novel?
9. Explore the concept of courage as depicted in To Kill a Mockingbird, considering both individual and collective acts of bravery.
10. Evaluate the impact of social and cultural norms on the characters' behavior and choices, particularly regarding gender roles and racial segregation.

Directions: Choose a book to read for enjoyment. It can be a novel, a graphic novel, or a nonfiction book. However, it needs to be on your reading level and should be more than 100 pages. During and after reading, answer the following journal questions. Spelling, grammar, punctuation, and mechanics are important and will count as part of the grade. 2. What is the theme of your story? (Examples: survival, friendship, loneliness, fear, guilt, honesty, growing up, etc.) Is there a moral?
3. What is the main problem or issue in your story?
4. Have you read books that are similar to this story? If so, explain.
5. Did something happen in your life that is similar to the events in the story?
6. Did any part of this book make you laugh or cry? Explain.
7. What is your opinion of this book? Would you recommend it to someone else? Why or why not?
8. Was this a difficult book to read? Explain.
9. At what point in the book were you "hooked"? Why?
10. Does this book give you any ideas for future writing pieces of your own?
11. Describe the setting of this section of the story. Did the author help you to visualize it? Does the setting influence the events of the story?
12. What character do you remember the most? Why?
13. If you were one of the characters in the book, would you have acted differently?

26. Discuss a portion of the book that was too predictable.
27. Write a letter to a character in your story.
28. Make a timeline of the major events (minimum 5 events) in this story.
