Please encourage your student to work on this throughout the summer rather than waiting until right before school starts. We would like this to be an enjoyable experience, not a chore.

Be sure you read the instructions on the assignments carefully. Spelling, grammar, punctuation, and mechanics are important and will count as part of the grade. The assignments should be typed in a google doc and shared with or emailed to aharper@bishopflaget.org. Any AI-generated responses will not be accepted and will result in a zero for the assignment.

The assigned books are as follows:

- Grade 6 *The Giver* by Lois Lowry
- Grade 7 The Man Who Was Poe by Avi
- Grade 8 To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

Wheatberry Books on 2nd St. has been contacted about Bishop Flaget summer reading, and they will be carrying a small stock of the assigned novels. All of these books are available from Amazon as well. Keep in mind that a physical copy of the book will be necessary when school starts since we will be using them during the first part of the first quarter.

Assigned novel: The Man Who Was Poe by Avi

Directions: During and after reading, answer the following journal questions. Spelling, grammar, punctuation, and mechanics are important and will count as part of the grade. All answers must be typed in a google doc and shared with or emailed to Mrs. Harper at aharper@bishopflaget.org. (My recommendation is to make a copy of the assignment from your google drive.)

Any Al-generated responses will not be accepted and will result in a zero for the assignment.

- 1. In "The Man Who Was Poe," what evidence can you find to support the claim that Dupin is a skilled and observant detective?
- 2. How does the setting of the story, specifically Baltimore in the 1840s, contribute to the overall atmosphere and mood?
- 3. Analyze the character of Edmund, comparing and contrasting his actions and motivations at the beginning and end of the story. What factors contribute to his development?
- 4. In what ways does the author use suspense and foreshadowing to engage the reader throughout the story? Provide specific examples.
- 5. Discuss the significance of the raven as a symbol in the story. How does its presence impact the reader's understanding of the events?
- 6. Evaluate the relationship between Dupin and Edmund. How does their partnership evolve over time, and what does it reveal about their individual strengths and weaknesses?
- 7. What ethical dilemmas do the characters face in "The Man Who Was Poe"? How do their decisions impact the outcome of the story?
- 8. Examine the role of language and communication in the story. How does Avi use dialogue and the exchange of information to develop suspense and deepen the reader's understanding of the characters?
- 9. Analyze the structure of "The Man Who Was Poe" and its impact on the story. How does the author's use of alternating perspectives contribute to the reader's experience?
- 10. Reflect on the theme of justice and its portrayal in the story. How does Avi explore the concept of justice through the characters' actions and the resolution of the mystery?

6th, 7th, 8th Book of your choice

Directions: Choose a book to read for enjoyment. It can be a novel, a graphic novel, or a nonfiction book. However, it needs to be on your reading level and should be more than 100 pages. During and after reading, answer the following journal questions. Spelling, grammar, punctuation, and mechanics are important and will count as part of the grade. All answers must be typed in a google doc and shared with or emailed to Mrs. Harper at aharper@bishopflaget.org. (My recommendation is to make a copy of the assignment from your google drive.)

- 2. What is the theme of your story? (Examples: survival, friendship, loneliness, fear, guilt, honesty, growing up, etc.) Is there a moral?

- 4. Have you read books that are similar to this story? If so, explain.
- 5. Did something happen in your life that is similar to the events in the story?
- 6. Did any part of this book make you laugh or cry? Explain.
- 7. What is your opinion of this book? Would you recommend it to someone else? Why or why not?
- 8. Was this a difficult book to read? Explain.
- 9. At what point in the book were you "hooked"? Why?
- 10. Does this book give you any ideas for future writing pieces of your own?
- 11. Describe the setting of this section of the story. Did the author help you to visualize it? Does the setting influence the events of the story?
- 12. What character do you remember the most? Why?
- 13. If you were one of the characters in the book, would you have acted differently?
